Acheeva Beds give comfort to children with special needs



MedEquip4Kids has provided another two Acheeva Beds for Lancasterian School in Manchester, a specialist school for children aged 3-16 with special educational needs including physical difficulties, complex medical conditions and communication needs. When we visited the school we met 12-year-old Omari, a pupil in Willow Class. At the age of two, Omari was diagnosed with a degenerative condition, which caused him to rapidly lose function. Due to his limited mobility he has to lie in a horizontal position and requires supportive postural equipment to ensure that he is comfortable. Omari responds well to voices and he uses a head switch that enables him to communicate his choices. For the last four years Omari has used an Acheeva Bed for most of his time in school. Lying



in the same position for more than an hour causes him pain, so he has to be repositioned regularly. Because the bed can be adjusted and tilted, it makes it easier for staff to change his height and angle as required. Omari is able to lie on the bed while participating in the class activities at eye level with his classmates, which improves his learning and helps to give him a sense of inclusion. The new Acheeva Beds will benefit more children like Omari, improving their physical comfort and emotional wellbeing.

Switch-adapted toys help kids learn to play

Acorns Primary School in Preston caters for pupils aged 2-11 with learning difficulties, including severe learning difficulties and autism spectrum disorder (ASD), as well as profound and multiple learning disabilities (PMLD). Many of the pupils experience difficulties acquiring early play skills, which are fundamental to a child's development. A switch-adapted toy allows children with disabilities to interact using a button press, eye blink, mouth puff or other motion. The child can use their switch to tell their toy to move, make sounds or flash lights.

Thanks to a grant from the Dorothy Pamela Smith CIO, we were able to fund a range of switch-adapted toys for Acorn Primary School. Sophie Martindale, a teacher at the school, says: "The children love the lights and movement many of these switch toys have and are highly motivated to explore and investigate how to make them work. They have been great for pupils to develop their understanding of cause and effect and we have also noticed improved concentration and engagement when using them."

Help keep new babies warm in their cots

We're providing heated mattresses to care for babies in neo natal intensive care units at Saint Mary's Hospital, Wythenshawe Hospital and North Manchester General Hospital. The transition from an incubator into a cot gives parents more contact with their baby, which is so valuable to their wellbeing. However, sick and preterm babies are not always able to control their body temperature, and maintaining their temperature in the cot is vitally important to reduce the risk of hypothermia. These special heated mattresses will ensure that heat is evenly distributed and the controller will allow the nurse to gradually reduce the temperature as the baby becomes more stable.



Play time at Nottingham Children's Hospital

We are still in need of funds for games and toys for Nottingham Children's Hospital. The resources will be used across all 12 wards, benefiting over 1,000 children each year. Jamie-Lee Phillipson, Hospital Play Specialist says: "Our role is to normalize a child's stay in hospital as much as possible, and the one thing all children know how to do is play. Having good facilities really will help aid their recovery and help to create a positive experience for the duration of their stay."

Reduced waiting times for ear treatment

The paediatric ward and assessment unit at Ormskirk and District General Hospital treats over 30,000 children annually and numbers are increasing each year, creating more demand for equipment and treatment space. Auroscopes are vital pieces of equipment for examining children's ears. The current ones used on the ward are fixed to the wall, which limits access and can delay assessment and treatment. A portable auroscope could be taken to another treatment room on the ward, improving waiting times and reducing discomfort for young patients.
